THE GYPSY ROMANI

History

The Romani, colloquially the Gypsies, represent a diaspora from northwestern India 1,500 years ago. Although most live in Europe today, over one million live in the U.S. and 800,000 live in Brazil. Historically known for living and traveling in wagons and caravans, the Romani place great value on the family, including extended family. Romani law required a groom's family to pay a price to the bride's parents, and although not often practiced today, cross border federal money laundering cases still exist related to arranged marriages. Today, most Romani in the U.S. are Christians, own homes, seek education and don't look or act much differently than this writer or reader. It was not the same in Germany in the 1930s; Hitler made the smaller stature Romani an early target.

Legends & Lessons

This field served as a site for caravaning Gypsies. They camped for the night between "Freeborn Village" (behind the red house) and the Church.

The wagons were an annual attraction to settlers who were forewarned by hearing the caravans' bells from miles away. The Gypsy traditions of dancing, music-making, and living and maintaining their culture on the road were all attractions. Crowd sources say that they were headed to Pierce County (south of Tacoma) and spent the summers in western British Columbia. Most descendants today are reported to reside in the southern Nevada area. Victims of exclusion and ethnic cleansing in our lifetimes, they were one of the first cultural groups at Auschwitz to be exterminated (Jehovah's Witnesses being another). A kinder, but silent cleansing today, is the assimilation into American life through marriage and loss of traditions.

Many today would agree with the Gypsies who favored wagons as homes; You never own a house or property, a *house always owns you.* So why not stay mobile? These efforts are now underway with assistance of loc
